6	FINDINGS OF FACT				
7	A hearing was held before the undersigned hearing				
8	officer on October 22, 1982 in Fairbanks, Alaska. The purpose				
9	of the hearing was to determine the facts regarding the proposed				
10	revocation of Richard Bergmann's certificate as a police officer				
11	in the State of Alaska.				
12	The Alaska Police Standards Council was represented at				
13	the hearing by Assistant Attorney General Gayle A. Horetski.				
14	Three witnesses were presented: John Marshall, Deputy Director,				
15	North Slope Borough Department of Public Safety; Lewis Wood, now				
16	employed with the Fairbanks Airport Security Police (formerly				
17	with the North Slope Borough Department of Public Safety) and				
18	Mr. James Mayer, Administrator, Alaska Police Standards Council.				
19	Twenty-three exhibits, labeled A through W, were offered and				
20	admitted as evidence. Respondent Bergmann did not appear at				
21	the hearing, although he was aware of the hearing date. Based				
22	upon the testimony of the above named witnesses and the written				
23	exhibits, I make the following findings of fact:				
24	1. In April of 1981 Richard Bergmann, at that time				
25	employed as a police officer with the North Slope Borough				
26	Department of Public Safety, approached Charlotte Brower,				
27	Magistrate of the Barrow District Court, in the Barrow Airport.				

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Bergmann began to berate Ms. Brower in a loud voice concerning a decision she had recently made in a criminal bail hearing. His behavior prompted a memo from Magistrate Brower to Bergmann's supervisor, Sergeant Edward Ward. In her memo Magistrate Brower Officer accused Bergmann of а lack of discretion and professionalism, and indicated that his behavior reflected upon the department. See Exhibit A. ECEI D -1-

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2. While employed with the North Slope Borough Richard Bergmann often failed to use proper radio procedures; he failed to properly identify himself on the radio, was absent from the air without explanation and kept incomplete radio logs. See the testimony of Officer Wood and Exhibit B.

3. While employed with the North Slope Borough respondent Bergmann on occasion failed to read daily information notices posted on the bulletin board in the Public Safety Department squadroom and failed to check his personal box for directives. This resulted in a lack of awareness of day-to-day information within the department. See Exhibit C.

4. On several occasions when repremanded by a superior officer Mr. Bergmann complained to more senior officers or went directly to the Director of the North Slope Borough Department of Public Safety. This violates the procedures for observing chain of command within the department. See testimony of Deputy Director Marshall and Exhibits D, J, N, and P.

5. In several instances Mr. Bergmann conducted incomplee criminal investigations and submitted totally inadequate written reports. See Exhibits E and W and testimony of Mr. Marshall.

6. While investigating a motor vehicle accident Mr. Bergmann failed to obtain adequate identification of the parties As a result, the accident report named the wrong involved. When ordered to write a letter of apology to the person. citizen wrongly named, Bergmann sent a brief grammatically incorrect letter containing numerous mispelled words. Deputy Director Marshall, who did not see a copy of the letter until after it had been sent, testified that in his opinion the letter reflected adversely upon the department. See testimony of Marshall and Exhibits N and O.

7. On February 5, 1982 Richard Bergmann was dispatched to investigate the report of a severe beating. The victim, a woman who was eight months pregnant, was at the Public

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Health Service emergency room. Rather than responding directly to the hospital, Officer Bergmann drove his patrol vehicle to a gas station to get gas. The route to the gas station took him close to and beyond the hospital, but he did not stop to investigate the report. There was another patrol car available when Bergmann began his shift; that car had sufficient gas in it to enable him to respond to the call. Because of Bergmann's failure to respond to the call, Officer Wood (who should have been off duty) had to report to the hospital and handle the case. Testimony of Officer Lewis Wood and Exhibits G, P, and Q. 8. On several occasions Mr. Bergmann failed to

respond to the direct orders of his supervisors. See, for example, Exhibits H, I, P, and Q.

9. On at least one occasion the respondent used obscene and offensive language to a female employee of the department. See Exhibits M and Q.

10. Mr. Bergmann exhibited a lack of respect for his superior officers. On one occasion he told a lieutenant: "screw you". Testimony of Deputy Director Marshall, Exhibits N, P, and Q.

11. Mr. Bergmann's behavior as described above violated the North Slope Borough Department of Public Safety's personnel policies, specifically G-PE-79-1 and G-PE-79-2 (Exhibits T and U).

12. On February 17, 1982 respondent Bergmann was terminated for cause from the North Slope Borough Department of Public Safety. Testimony of Deputy Director Marshall, Exhibits R and S.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

13 AAC 85.100 sets forth the standard which applies in this case:

> Denial, Revocation, and Lapse of Certificates. (a) The council will, in its discretion, deny or revoke a basic, intermediate, or advanced certificate upon a finding that: ...(2) the applicant or holder of the certificate has been

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discharged or resigned under threat of discharge for cause from employment as a police officer in 1 this state or any other state ... 2 Based upon the above findings of fact, Ι conclude that 3 respondent Richard R. Bergmann was terminated for cause from his 4 employment as a police officer with the North Slope Borough 5 Department of Public Safety. This termination for cause 6 provides an adequate basis under 13 AAC 85.100(a)(2) for the 7 revocation of Bergmann's certificate as a police officer within 8 the State of Alaska. 9 THEREFORE, I HEREBY RECOMMEND that the Alaska Police 10 Standards Council revoke Richard Bergmann's certificate as a 11 police officer. -7 12this 29 of DATED at Fairbanks, Alaska November, 13 1982. 14 15J.
